Ray's Backpage

Time to publish the audited financial results for 2012 is now here. Comparing it with the previous year, you'll note some glaring variations. There's no doubt that the revenue enjoyed a special boost from a number of quarters with all categories showing an increase and the addition of a new category, that of the Pacific Mission as well. We are particularly grateful for the enormous response we have enjoyed from churches, sponsors and individual donors. We continue to trust the Lord to provide for what we believe is His ministry to the least, the last and the lost - in prisons in Australia and the Pacific.

With the expansion of the ministry come an increase in expenses; and the addition of new categories - office rental and Pacific Mission. The latter includes our share of employing Chaplain Japhlet Folia at the SWIM base in Honiara and the cost of couriering the lessons to and fro Sydney. The surplus in that category has been substantially reduced over the last three months and will need to attract continued contributions to be able to meet the budget for the remainder of the year.

Furthermore, the overall surplus has well and truly been eaten into by offsetting the deficits of the last three months -\$20442. In addition, the cost of establishing the office \$9959, replacing computers \$2617, and establishing the ministry in Lae, PNG \$5057. I won't bore you with the details but it would shock you to learn that the costs of getting our Bibles and lessons through Customs was three times the freight we paid on shipping them, which was covered by a donation. The cost of transferring our lessons from Port Moresby to Lae was a 'learning curve' shock. Breaking new ground can be trying and costly but, that's ministry and that's jail. But praise God, the ministry has started and the first batch of 136 lessons have come and gone.

So when a study is finished in Tier 2, we need to say Good bye to our student, as the student needs to move on and will have another Mentor appointed in Tier 3. This also came up via the Seminar and also lately at the office.

There are several organisations that help the inmates when released and CBI is one of them to refer the students to different places, if they want help. CBI will also help with finding a Bible believing and Christ centred Church and in NSW this is the work of Stephanie. We hope to have a person like her in every state. From the Fields

Greetings Friends

What a month it has been in the life of CBI. The highlight was my much planned trip to PNG and more specifically to establish the ministry of CBI in Buimo Prison at Lae. The trip started on the 28th of February and I returned to Australia on the 8th of March. During my time away every plan happened and it was obvious to all of us that God went before me. Thanks be to God that His work is now established in Buimo Prison.

The opportunity was there for me to conduct a church service at Bomana Womens Prison – Port Moresby on Saturday the 2nd of March. It was wonderful to meet with these 30 ladies again and to share the word of God. After the service I met with our students, totalling 12 women, answered their questions and just spent time in fellowship with them.

On Monday the 4th of March I travelled with a delegation of Corrective Services officers to Lae. Included amongst these was my dear friend Assist Commissioner, Michael Mosiri, who has been invaluable in CBI's activity in PNG. Also, travelling was Corrective Services Director, Dennis Piandi, who has control over PNG's northern prisons. In Lae I stayed with Tim Sikkema and family who, together with Ian Wildeboer and family, lead a church in Lae and are supported by the Free Reformed Churches in Australia. I thank Tim and Ian for their friendship and support.

The program was rolled out in the Womens Prison at Buimo on Tuesday the 5th. Of the 30 women prisoners, 9 enrolled which represents 100% of the ladies that have the literacy to do the studies. The program was rolled out at the mens/ remand/juvenile sections on Wednesday the 6th. Again we had a 100% uptake from those interested inmates that are literate in English. Friends, Buimo Prison is a first for CBI in that prisoners from all sections enrolled and included 5 officers. We had 150 lessons despatched to Buimo Prison and we had 150 enrolments!

Please continue to pray for the ministry in Buimo Prison, that the students will come into a rich relationship with our Lord and Saviour. Pray also for the Commander, Madam Judy Tara, that she will remain diligent in the running of CBI at Buimo Prison. Friends, I have never talked of money before but the establishment of CBI in Buimo Prison did come at a cost and with some unexpected costs. This remains Gods work and He has the hearts of Buimo Prisoners on His mind. Please do consider supporting CBI in our current financial need. Also this month I had a meeting with a Grafton Pastor on the 13th of March to discuss his church's involvement in CBI and also new Instructor, Ginette from Maclean, was trained on the 14th of March. We welcome Ginette to the ministry.

The following prison visits were made this month, Wolston CC (Brisbane Qld) on the 19th of March and Arthur Gorrie CC (Brisbane Qld) on the 21st of March.

Finally, whilst in one of the Brisbane Prisons this month, one of our students told me a familiar story of a loveless and fatherless upbringing and how he had been in and out of prison for the last 25 years. This man signed up to do CBI studies in December last year and as he said, for the wrong reasons, but he told me of the hope he now has. The new attitude and faith he puts down to two things. The first is the studies and how faithfully Jesus was introduced to him. The second is the letters of discipleship. Our student told me of one particular letter that he received from an Instructor who wrote the letter on her 21st birthday! This impacted our student and especially showed him that if an Instructor thinks that much of a prisoner on her 21st birthday then there must be something in this Christianity. Our student continues to delight in his learning and delights in receiving your letters.
